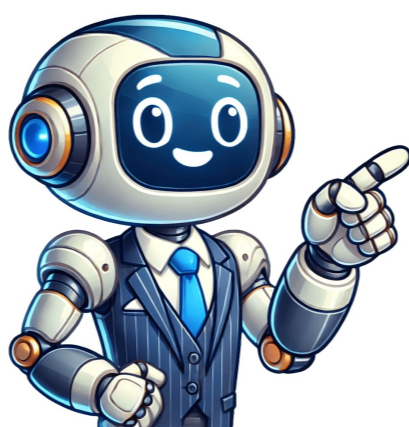


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## California achievement test

The California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP) is a state-mandated test that evaluates students in primary and secondary education. It replaced the Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program in October 2013. CAASPP consists of four components: Smarter Balanced Summative Assessments, California Alternate Assessment, California Science Test, and California Spanish Assessment. The Smarter Balanced tests cover English language arts and mathematics for grades three through eight and eleventh. The California Alternate Assessments are designed for students with significant cognitive disabilities. The California Science Test is taken in fifth grade, eighth grade, and once in high school, while the California Alternate Assessment for Science is for students who cannot take the science test. The California Spanish Assessment is an optional test that measures reading, writing, and listening skills in Spanish for grades three through twelve. Each spring, students in grades two through eleven must complete a series of tests as part of the state's STAR program. The California Standards Tests are designed to match the state's academic content standards and cover mathematics, English/language arts, science, and history-social science. The California Achievement Test shows how well students are performing compared to nationally, with scores driving intervention and award programs. The Schools Accountability Act of 1999 aimed to boost academic performance for all students. Prior to this, from the 1970s onwards, California used the California Assessment Program (CAP), with some districts adding extra tests like CTBS during that time. CAP was replaced by CLAS in 1990, but it was discontinued in 1994 due to controversies surrounding certain parts of the test. Each school district continued using their own exams, known as High School Competency Exams, which were mandatory for high school graduation and conformed to state guidelines. These tests met accountability requirements until the STAR program began in 1998. Under this program, nearly all students in grades two through eleven took a standardized test every year, with scores reported to parents by mid-August. The legislature reauthorized the STAR Program in 2002, replacing the Stanford 9 with the California Achievement Tests. Sixth Edition Survey (CAT/6 Survey) for national norm-referenced testing starting in spring 2003. Additionally, the State Board of Education authorized development of the California Alternate Performance Assessment (CAPA) for students with significant cognitive disabilities who couldn't take the CSTs and CAT/6 Survey even with modifications. The CAPA assessed identified content standards for these students, first administered in spring 2003. In August 2004, Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger reauthorized the STAR Program through 2011, reducing the CAT/6 Survey to grades three and seven. During 2005, the State Board designated Aprenda: La prueba de logros en español, Tercera edición (Aprenda 3) to replace SABE/2 as the primary language test for the STAR Program. The Standards-based Tests in Spanish (STS) replaced this test and were first administered in spring 2007 to students in grades two through four, and starting in 2009, it was available for students in grades two through eleven. Students taking STS must also take CSTs and/or the California Modified Assessment (CMA). In April 2007, the U.S. Department of Education implemented regulations for an alternate assessment based on modified achievement standards, leading to development of the CMA by the CDE for children with individualized education programs who meet eligibility criteria adopted by the State Board.
