## Blitz beta download

All platforms: Mozilla has just pushed out Firefox 3.1 Beta 1 to their servers, marking the first major step toward the official 3.1 release. They haven't yet officially announced the beta release, so the What's New page is a 404 as of this writing. Luckily we've already covered a lot of the features you can expect, so hit the jump for a closer look at what Firefox 3.1 Beta 1 brings to the table. Faster JavaScriptWe've shown you just how fast Firefox 3.1 is compared to other browsers, and most of that is due to the new TraceMonkey JavaScript engine. Despite the fact that TraceMonkey comes built into 3.1, you still have to know how to enable it to take advantage. Here's how it works: Open about:config in your browser.Paste javascript.options.jit.content into the filter.Double-click the remaining preference to set the boolean to true.Location Awareness Firefox 3.1 will introduce geolocation to the mix, streamlining the process required to get information from web sites based on your location. In the current release of Firefox, you needed to install the previously mentioned Geode extension to get this functionality, but it comes baked into 3.1. Improved Ctrl+Tab 3D interfaceWe told you months ago that Firefox 3.1 would have a fancy new 3D tab-switching interface, but now it's here and it looks great. What's Missing From what I can tell so far, this beta release does not yet include Private Browsing mode or the smarter session restore, but it's an exciting start. If you give it a try, share your experience with the new features in the comments. Mozilla says Beta 5 "includes more than 750 changes from the previous beta, improving stability and web compatibility." Testers and those willing to live on the edge with Beta 5 will get speedier JavaScript handling in webapps like Gmail and Zoho Office, better Windows/Mac/Linux integration, and an improved Places (bookmarks) organizer. Source: Hayato Huseman / Android Central Google has dropped Android 11 Beta 3, the final beta update. This is yet another stabilizing update, with most changes being under the hood. Android 11 is expected to release next month, on September 8. Google has announced the final Android 11 beta, due for release today. There isn't much new here, it's all under the hood stuff like with last month's update. While that one was focused on bringing platform stability, this release finalizes just about everything else for developers. Google is also releasing the official API 30 SDK, so developers can now start building app updates towards the release of the next big update, confident that everything will work as expected at launch. There is one small change here, and that is regarding how COVID-19 exposure notification apps work. Now, those apps will be able to work without using the location access permission. Google says that its because apps built on the Exposure Notification System "can't infer device location through Bluetooth scanning", though Google says other non-exposure notification apps will still be restricted from working like this. Android 11 can be expected to be announced on September 8. As a reminder, Android 11 can currently be downloaded on Pixel phones and select other third-party Android OEM phones. The newly launched Pixel 4a won't be eligible for beta updates yet, but Google will be adding support for the 4a sooner rather than later. Beta is the measure of the risk or volatility of a portfolio or investment compared with the market as a whole. Beta is used in the Capital Asset Pricing Model (CAPM) to help calculate the expected return of an asset.Deeper definitionBeta represents how a security responds to market swings. A beta of 1 is an indication that the price of the security moves with the market. A beta of less than 1 means that the security is less volatile than the market. A beta of more than 1 means the security is more volatile than the market overall.For those who follow CAPM, beta is a significant measure. The price variability of a stock is important in the assessment of risk. Indeed, when thinking about risk as the possibility of a stock losing value, beta becomes a proxy for risk. Look at it in terms of an early technology stock with a price that moves up and down more than the market does. This would naturally lead you to think that the stock is riskier than a utility industry stock with a low beta.Beta offers a quantifiable and clear measurement. There are variations in beta based on things such as the market index used and the time period measured, but when looked at in a broad context, beta is basically straightforward.Example of betaAn exchange-traded fund, or ETF, with a beta of 0.65 is 35 percent less volatile than the market. Most utility stocks have a beta of less than 1. Most high-end stocks have a beta of more than 1, offering the possibility of a higher rate of return — but posing more risk. Short for "application," apps let you do everything from listening to music to syncing your phone to your car to playing games. With so many apps to choose from, however, it can be a bit daunting if you don't know how to download them. Fortunately, downloading apps can be quick, simple and easy regardless of the kind of technology you're using. Read on to learn about how and where to download apps. When you download a file on the net, whether from a store or elsewhere, a file hosted on an online server is copied onto your computer. If you've ever been online, either on a phone or computer, you've likely already downloaded files on many occasions. Apps are no different — they're just specific kinds of files you download from the internet. Sometimes (especially when it's meant for computers), an app is compressed into a ZIP file (.zip or .zipx) to save space. To do this, you may need another program, such as WinZip or 7-Zip, to open it, although you may also be able to open it by left- or right-clicking if your device came with the ability to open ZIP files. In many cases, however, downloading an app is as simple as clicking a button on an app's page. As long as there's enough space left on your device, the app will likely be ready for use once it's done downloading. Android is an operating system used for phones, tablets and more. Odds are that if your phone isn't an iPhone, it's probably an Android device — brands include Samsung, Huawei, LG, Motorola, ZTE and many more. To download apps for an Android device, you can either visit the Android website or use the Google Play app. (It's often pre-installed on phones and tablets, so you may already have it.) Be aware that you'll likely be prompted to sign in with your Google account or create one if you haven't already.
